Wayne Elementary School (WES) has launched an exciting set of new initiatives this March aimed at enhancing learning experiences, fostering early childhood development, and creating a nurturing school environment. These forward-thinking programs underscore the school's commitment to innovation and meeting the diverse needs of its students and community.

Reading Adventure Bags

The school library has unveiled "Reading Adventure Bags," a thoughtful collection of 24 themed text sets carefully curated to ignite students' love for reading and hands-on learning. Each bag contains a assortment of fiction and nonfiction books, complemented by engaging activities and resources related to the central theme.

With subjects ranging from dinosaurs to fairy tales, these bags cater to students across multiple age groups. Kindergarten Community of Practice Playgroup

This proactive approach not only nurtures social-emotional skills but also lays a solid foundation for future academic success.

Therapy Dog Program

Recognizing the profound impact that animal-assisted interventions can have on students' well-being, WES has implemented a therapy dog program. Mookie joined the Wayne Staff at the end of the month. He visits classrooms and interacts with students in a controlled and supervised manner with his handler, principal, Jeanette Jacobs.

The presence of gentle companions like Mookie have been shown to reduce stress and anxiety, improve motivation and socialization skills, and foster a more positive learning environment. With proper protocols in place, the therapy dog program promises to be a valuable addition to the school's holistic approach to education.

Throughout these initiatives, WES is striving to achieve three overarching goals:

1. Enhance student engagement and academic achievement by providing innovative, hands-on learning opportunities that cater to the diverse needs of all learners.

2. Promote social-emotional development, fostering a nurturing and inclusive school climate that supports the well-being of all students.

3. Strengthen community relationships and partnerships, actively involving caregivers and community members in the educational journey of WES students.

With these new programs, WES is demonstrating its dedication to continuous improvement and its commitment to providing a rich, supportive, and forward-thinking educational experience for its students and community.

Parker Pond Headland Preserve Mud Season Trail Closure

Kennebec Land Trust's (KLT) Parker Pond Headland Preserve on Fellows Cove Road in Fayette is temporarily closed to hikers during mud season (March – April/May). Currently, the Fellows Cove Road is only open to homeowners to minimize the impacts on the road.



During mud season, KLT recommends hikers visit the nearby Ezra Smith Conservation Area in Mount Vernon, Torsey Pond Nature Preserve or Rosmarin & Saunders Family Forest in Readfield or Hutchinson Pond in Manchester instead. However, please help take care of all our local trails by staying off them when they are muddy. Maine Big Night

with Kennebec Land Trust and Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed Gott Pasture Preserve, Wayne March – April, Date and time - weather dependent

Kennebec Land Trust and Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed will be participating in the state-wide community science project Maine Big Night. With help from volunteers, we will be collecting data on migrating frogs and salamanders as they cross roadways during the spring.

What is a "Big Night"?

Every year when temperatures and weather are right (thawed ground, 40-degree temperatures, and wet roads at night) amphibians embark on a mass migration from their winter habitat to their breeding grounds in vernal pools or other wetlands. Roadways pose significant challenges for amphibians and lead to high mortality rates. Monitoring big nights provides data on amphibian migrations and helps to implement conservation strategies for safer passage.

How to volunteer?

KLT and Friends of the Cobbossee have adopted two 1000-foot-long roadway sites to monitor near KLT's Gott Pasture Preserve in Wayne. Anyone who can operate safely on a roadway is invited to join. Volunteers will collect data on amphibians present and help them safely cross the road. Safety vests and headlamps are required to participate. KLT and Friends will have them available, but please bring your own if you have them. Families are encouraged to participate, but kids must be old enough to be aware of road safety. Contact Marie or Cami to sign up and then when the conditions are right between March 15th and May 15th, (wet roads and 40 degrees at night) we'll contact you that day.

Every year when the ground has thawed, and temperature and weather conditions are right amphibians embark on a mass migration from their winter habitat to their breeding grounds in vernal pools and other wetlands during a "big night". In 2018 Greg Leclair started the Maine Big Night citizen science project in one town to collect data on how roadways are affecting amphibians during their migration. It has now turned into a state-wide citizen science project and a new nonprofit. 
